Great progress for heritage venture

Prior to obtaining a £55,200 grant in May 2014 from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) for the 'WORKING LIVES: WORKING TOGETHER' project, Halton Heritage Partnership had to produce an Action Plan of what it hoped to accomplish and give a detailed timeline of exactly how this would be realised by December 2015. We are delighted to be able to report that we've achieved far more to date than we anticipated at the outset!

To start with, the Action Plan was modestly ambitious, with the aim of encouraging the various heritage groups throughout the borough to work together on two fronts; improving access to Halton's heritage by upgrading the existing website, (www.haltonscollections.org) and by collaborating on the specific theme of gathering information about the working lives of local people since 1800.

However, as Frank Lawless from Widnes Historical society explains: "As links have been strengthened between the partners, the original Plan has been updated to reflect our new aspirations including organising larger scale events, enhanced publicity and social media training for group members, all of which have now been realised."

Valuable new members have now come on board including Preston Brook History Group, Daresbury District Heritage Group & Sankey Canal Restoration Society. There seems to be a number of new heritage related initiatives around at the moment and those groups are very welcome to be part of HHP. The success of this 'WORKING TOGETHER' element has meant that the Partnership has been able to hold a number of well received public events, taking heritage out into the community. The last one was at Runcorn Town Hall's Open Day in December in the form of a film premiere, (complete with popcorn and a red carpet) where Halton Young People's Theatre debuted their 'WORKING LIVES' films. This is

another successful element of the updated Action Plan, which aimed to engage with more young people (read more on the theatre group later on in the newsletter).

One of the original ideas was to develop an app which would allow users to follow various trails interweaved with stories from the oral histories collected for 'WORKING LIVES': however, this proved problematic so that concept was replaced with developing a much more interactive website which will link visitors to the trails and a good mobile version of the site will also be available.

The 'WORKING LIVES' aspect has uncovered many fascinating stories and curious objects which will all be available to hear and view on the enhanced website which is currently under development. The initial collection of oral histories is now complete but further research and the cataloguing of objects will be on-going by the HHP members and will continue after the end of the project.

Due to the time lost in researching the app idea, HLF has agreed to an extended deadline. The culmination of the project will now tie in with Halton's Heritage Open Days in September 2016. Before then, there will be an end of project celebration, 'Canal-ival' in May or June, which will be led by Halton Young People's Theatre and involve both HHP members and non-members and will be a fabulous community occasion on the Bridgewater Canal, near to The Brindley.

The Partnership now has a mission statement: 'Working together to bring Halton's heritage to life'. We hope you agree that it sums up exactly what we hope to achieve and we look forward to sharing further progress with you in the coming months.

Blue is still the colour

Stuart Allen from Runcorn Historical Society has been continuing in his mission to highlight significant people and places from Runcorn's past by arranging for 20 blue plaques to be positioned on relevant buildings around the town.

The building was restored and reopened in 1998 Look out for more!

So far he has installed 17 and the latest ones to look out for are at:

- The Quayside, Canal Street location of Runcorn Football Club's original ground
- **Co-op store, Granville Street** in recognition of Sir William Dudley O.B.E. (1868 – 1938), born in Loch Street and became President of the Co-operative Wholesale Society in 1933
- **Tricorn Pub, Palacefields** site of Hallwood Manor, birthplace of Sir John Chesshyre (1662 - 1738), a prominent lawyer who was responsible for one of the first free libraries in England, in Halton Village
- **Old 'Boathouse' Inn, Mersey Road** dedicated to the old ferry service which ran from what was then called Mersey Street
- **Old Police Station, High Street** built in 1831 as Runcorn's first Town Hall & Bridewell (jail)

There are just three more to go and they will appear on **Runcorn** <u>Historical Society's Facebook page</u> as each one is put in place.



Norton Priory's makeover is well underway

The new museum at Norton Priory is taking shape, thanks to its £3.7m grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund for the impressive 'Monastery to Museum Staff and volunteers recently donned 900' project.

It is still on course to be open in August this year, despite the odd unexpected occurrence such as having to relocate bats. Building contractor, HH Smith has

now taken down the majority of the old museum building and the tiled floor in the medieval undercroft has been carefully removed by archaeologists but will be re-instated once conservation works are completed *.

their hard hats and hi-vis vests for the opportunity to explore the museum site to see the progress being made. It is hoped that members of the public will also get a chance for a behind the scenes tour in the spring, so keep a look out for

those details in the press and on Norton Priory's social media sites.

Susan Brownrigg, Learning & Community Officer, said: "Brilliant to see how fast the build is coming along, the metal structure is up, and the walls are down! Those who were brave enough went up onto the top of the undercroft to look at the new first floor gallery, with great views over the ruins. It really helped staff and volunteers get a feel for the new layout and just what a transformation the Heritage Lottery grant is bringing about."







Hello, I'm Jean Bradburn & I'm the Oral Historian for the WORKING LIVES: WORKING **TOGETHER** project.


I've long had fascination history and as a librarian, managed the local history collection in Widnes library for many years. Whilst there, I created an image website for Halton



www.picturehalton.org.uk by digitising the various libraries' photographic collections to make it easier for the public to find historical images of the Borough and also to ensure that we had a record of these photos, before the originals 'disappeared', as so many items unfortunately tend to do over the years.

Now that I've retired, like so many people say, I've been busier than ever! I am an adult tutor and run courses in family history and together with my husband John, a photographer, I've published four local history books, including 'Widnes through time' and 'Runcorn through the ages' and the most recent is 'Central Manchester through time'. Each book compares an old picture with a view of the present day along with fascinating facts I'd discovered about the local legends, buildings and people.
